WHAT IS ALMSGIVING?

Understanding the Lenten (and Year-Round) Charitable Practice

The Catholic Church considers almsgiving "a witness to fraternal charity" and "a work of justice pleasing to God" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, No. 2462). Almsgiving is the act of donating money or goods to the poor or performing other acts of charity. But many Catholics are surprised to learn that **the practice of giving alms isn't just a Lenten spiritual discipline.** It is meant to be a year-round exercise, an integral part of our spiritual lives, and can be a tool that leads us to a deeper union with Jesus Christ and the universal church.

WHAT DOES ALMSGIVING MEAN?

The roots of the word "alms" can be found in ancient Latin and Greek words meaning mercy and pity. Similarly, the root of the word "charity" comes from the Latin "caritas," meaning love.

Charitable giving is an ancient practice that is customary in many cultures and religions. As Christians, we are called to follow in the example of Christ who showed great compassion to those on the fringes of society. Even if we do not see them, the poor have always been among us and so has the call to support them.

The Catechism states that charity is "the theological virtue by which we love God above all things for his own sake, and our neighbor as ourselves for the love of God" (CCC, No. 1822).

More than simply giving money, almsgiving is an act of love that incorporates both prayer and fasting and manifests itself by caring for our neighbor in need. As we help our brothers and sisters who live in poverty, we become more connected to God and to one another.

WHY IS ALMSGIVING IMPORTANT?

At its core, almsgiving is a spiritual and religious practice that strengthens our love for others, increases our detachment and contributes to greater social justice.

This threefold meaning of almsgiving helps us understand why it is particularly central to the season of Lent. During Lent, Jesus invites us into a deeper journey with him, and to journey with Jesus Christ means to live as Christ lived.

Throughout his ministry, we see Jesus caring in a special way for sinners, tax collectors, the impoverished, the sick and anyone else on the margins of society. With the rich young man and with the scribes and Pharisees who persecute him, we see Jesus chastising them and calling them to a higher order of love, mercy and material detachment so that they too can serve the poor as they ought.

When we give alms, we are making a concrete donation of ourselves (through money, time, talent or service) to others. The concreteness of almsgiving is crucial. Although prayer for others is worthy and good, almsgiving helps us say, in crystal clear terms: "Here is what I can offer, and I offer it out of love for you (and God) because I care about your welfare."

HOW IS ALMSGIVING AN ACT OF JUSTICE?

The Church teaches us that all people are made in the image of God and so possess equal and inherent dignity. Each person has a right to all they need to live their full potential as intended by God.

At the root of the practice of almsgiving is the principle that "everyone should look upon his neighbor (without any exception) as 'another self,' above all bearing in mind his life and the means necessary for living it with dignity" (CCC, No. 1931). This responsibility to care for our neighbors becomes even more important when it involves those who are disadvantaged (CCC, No. 1932).

By treating our neighbor as "another self" we are removing any human barriers that might separate us. God sees all men and women as his children, equal in his eyes, and therefore deserving of fair and just treatment. Almsgiving allows justice to flourish through simple acts of love and compassion.

Our Mission



THREE PILLARS OF LENT







Meaningful Lent symbols that reflect the season

ASHES: Ash Wednesday, which marks the beginning of Lent, is named after the practice of marking one's forehead with ashes shaped like a <u>cross</u>. This symbolizes repentance and humility and the temporary nature of human life. In ancient times, ashes served as a symbol of mourning and repentance.

CEOWN of THORNS: The Crown of Thorns is a symbol of the suffering that Jesus endured on the cross. It is said to have been made from thorns found in the Garden of Gethsemane and placed on Jesus' head during his crucifixion.

The Crown of Thorns reminds us of the price that Jesus paid for our salvation.

THE STATIONS OF THE CROSS: Also known as The Way of the Cross, this ritual offers the chance to think about the crucifixion of Jesus. Each station is an opportunity to think about the pain and suffering Jesus went through because God loves us. The stations typically are prayed every Friday evening during Lent except on Good Friday, when the Stations of the Cross traditionally are prayed at 3 p.m.

THE PALM BRANCHES: Symbolize Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem. The branches remind Catholics that there are both triumphs and defeats in life but that if they maintain their friendship with God, they will ultimately triumph.

THE FISH: A Lenten symbol for the obligation to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday and to abstain from all flesh meat on every Friday in Lent. In the early days of the Church, the fish was a secret sign for Christ's followers, who were forced to worship in the catacombs in Rome. Now it is a symbol that stands for a Christian who has been brought to life in the waters of the Sacrament of Baptism.

THE VIOLET COLOR: The liturgical color for the season of Lent, as well as the color of the stole worn by the priest for the Sacrament of Reconciliation; it signifies suffering and sorrow. Violet is a somber color that symbolizes mourning, suffering, humility, regret and the willingness to do penance, particularly fasting. Violet's association with suffering is based upon Jesus' Passion, when the soldiers clothed him in a purple cloak and tortured him (Mk 15:17-20; Jn 19:2-3). **THE MONEY BAG:** Symbolizes the Lenten penitential practice of


almsgiving; money put into the bag is then donated to the poor.




Some names the Bible uses to describe Jesus help us to understand Him more.

knowing Jesus grows our soul and spirit.




Jesus is the water of life.

Jesus is the door for the sheep. John chapter 10 verse 9. He keeps us safe when we follow Him. Sheep trust their shepherd.




Jesus is the true vine. John chapter 15 verse 1. We are the branches and we get our strength from the Him.




Jesus is the lamb of God.

We only need to believe in our redeemer.







